WHAT IS OUR MOST VALUABLE BOOK?

We are often asked what is our most valuable book? Most of our books sell for between £1-£3. But sometimes a real gem comes in. A book called Night Thoughts which was illustrated by William Blake. It was produced by the Folio Society some twenty years ago as a Ltd Edition and sold for £450. It wasn't just a coffee table book it was the size of a Coffee Table! Certainly the largest book we have ever had and beautifully illustrated. It was sold to a member of the William Blake Society in London for £600 and he was very pleased to receive the book. It took us quite a time to pack the book and make sure it was packed carefully to avoid any damage.











OUR BIGGEST DONATION OF BOOKS CAME FROM:

Recently, we had our largest donation of books. It took Keith and a few helpers 15 car-loads to bring them to the shop. Thankfully, they were local and we would like to thank the family and friends of Andor Gomme for the donation. The donation filled the middle shed and we are still going through the collection.

Andor Gomme was a British scholar of English literature and architectural history. He was a frequent reviewer for the Times Literary Supplement, an author of books on both literary criticism and architectural history, and Chair of the Society of Architectural Historians of Great Britain, whose journal, Architectural History, he edited for many years.

It certainly was a fantastic collection with books on artists and art history, from all periods both old and modern. A very good architectural section with lots of interesting books.

- Then there is the literature, All the major figures of English figure with many books on writers such as D.H.Lawrence, George Elliott, Dickens, Hardy and others.
- A superb collection of books by and about Edward Lear.
- What didn't he collect? A very interesting collection which will take us a few months to get through and put out on the shelves.
 - And then we found the records!!!! We finished collecting the books and someone said –"Do you want the records?" Thinking there would be the usual 40 or 50 L'P's we said yes. Two car loads later with over 500 classical records we filled another shed!!!

What a collection... then we had another donation form a minister in York!!!


DO YOU KNOW SOMEONE WHO PLAYS IRISH MUSIC?

- Easy free parking on the street outside.








ONE OF OUR STRANGEST SALES
